EDUCATORS RECEIVE \$10,500 TO IMPROVE CLASSROOMS

The Logan Health Foundation and School-Based Services awarded \$500 grants to 21 educators at Flathead Valley schools last October. The Healthy Classrooms grants provide funding to local schools to aid in the creation or improvement of student-centered and staff-related healthy living initiatives.

The awarded grants will fund projects such as healthy snacks for students, new athletic and playground equipment, in-classroom cooking

tools and nutrition education curriculum, new bikes for district bike safety program, wobble stools and flexible seating for students in the classroom, and social-emotional health curriculum resources.

"When we support our schools and educators, we are investing in the lives of our children, the prosperity of our community, and the well-being of our future generations," says Joe McClafferty, president of the Logan Health Foundation. "Their dedication fuels the dreams of our students, and it's a privilege to be a part of that journey."
