LOGAN HEALTH HOSPITALS RECOGNIZED FOR **PERFORMANCE LEADERSHIP**

Four Logan Health hospitals were recognized for 2024 Performance Leadership Awards by The Chartis Center for Rural Health. These awards highlight rural hospitals for performing in the top quartile (75th percentile or above) in Quality, Outcomes, and/or Patient Perspective. Logan Health hospitals received recognition in each category this year: Logan Health - Conrad and Logan Health - Cut Bank for Quality, Logan Health Medical Center for Outcomes and Logan Health -Whitefish for Patient Perspective.

"These awards are a reflection of Logan Health's commitment to delivering high-quality care to rural communities across Montana," said Logan Health CEO Kevin Abel. "The dedication of our teams to serving Montanans, regardless of location, continues to drive the positive outcomes and exceptional patient experiences highlighted by this recognition."

The Performance Leadership Awards are based on data from the Chartis Rural Hospital Performance INDEX, the industry's most comprehensive and objective assessment of rural hospital performance.

BUILDING THE FUTURE OF HEALTH CARE: LOGAN **HEALTH'S TRAINING AND RESIDENCY PROGRAMS**

Logan Health is dedicated to developing a skilled and compassionate health care workforce. The New Graduate RN Residency program along with its Certified Nursing Aide (CNA) and Registered Medical Assistant (RMA) training programs provide paid, hands-on education led by credentialed nurse instructors. In 2024, Logan Health trained 127 CNA students in six cohorts and 40 RMA students. For many students, these programs are just the start of building a fulfilling career in health care.

The New Graduate RN Residency Program ensures a smooth transition from academic studies to professional nursing. This 12-month program combines patientfacing orientation with professional development and produced 36 graduates in 2024. With three annual cohorts in February, July and October, 55 new RNs began their journey with Logan Health this year.

These programs play a vital role in ensuring quality health care in our community, equipping caregivers with the skills and confidence to meet the needs of our growing population.

LOGAN HEALTH PERFORMS MONTANA'S FIRST MINIMALLY INVASIVE LASER INTERSTITIAL THERMAL THERAPY (LITT) PROCEDURE IN BRAIN TUMOR

In December, Logan Health successfully performed Montana's first minimally invasive Laser Interstitial Thermal Therapy (LITT) brain tumor procedure, marking a significant advancement in brain tumor treatment for the state and region. Using the NeuroBlate® System from Monteris Medical, a state-of-the-art MRI-guided laser technology, a team led by Neurosurgeon T.C. Origitano, MD, PhD, precisely targeted and successfully treated a patient's brain tumor through minimally invasive thermal ablation. This innovative approach allows surgeons to destroy abnormal tissue while preserving healthy tissue, using real-time MRI monitoring to ensure accuracy throughout the procedure.



"This is an important step in providing the people of Montana with advanced neurologic care," said Dr. Origitano. "The precision and minimally invasive nature of the LITT allow us to address the challenging cases that we see with reduced risk and quicker recovery times. It also allows for our patients to receive this care closer to home."

In addition to reducing surgical risks, LITT has been shown to result in shorter hospital stays and faster recovery times compared to traditional brain surgery. Many patients do not require an intensive care stay and are discharged with one to two stitches in the skull. This is especially beneficial for patients in Montana, where traveling long distances for follow-up care can be a significant burden.

By adopting innovative approaches to neurosurgical treatment, Logan Health continues to focus on patient-centered care and improving outcomes for those facing complex medical challenges.
